Introductory information:

Humanity is facing a red line of climate crisis, beyond which the scale of the consequences of climate change may be unpredictable. Climate issues have long since moved into the existential plane: the question is whether our humanity will develop sustainably when we cross the critical line.

Children born in 2021 are projected to experience seven times more heat waves, nearly three times more droughts and twice as many wildfires than their grandparents. However, these impacts will be felt unequally, with young people living in developing countries suffering the most.

The climate threat is therefore not only an issue of environmental and social justice, but also of intergenerational justice. Future generations should not suffer from decisions taken without taking their interests into account. Young people have every right to participate in decisions concerning their future, and this right cannot be ignored.

Kyrgyzstan is actively implementing climate commitments through the preparation of NDCs, the National Adaptation Plan and the Carbon Neutrality Strategy, and is preparing for a new round of NDCs in 2025. It is important to note that the voices of young people have been heard and taken into account in the process of preparing climate strategies. For example, the Regional Conference of Youth and Children of Central Asia and Afghanistan (RCOY Central Asia and Afghanistan 2024), held in September 2024, became a key event designed to promote the power of climate action, united by young people of the region. The result of RCOY Central Asia and Afghanistan 2024 is the Regional Statement of Youth and Children, which has become an integral part of the Global Youth Statement, which has already been presented at COY19 and COP 29, and will influence the adoption of key climate decisions.





Since the first COP, children and youth have shown strong interest in and presence in UNFCCC processes and have sought to advance greater ambition. Since COP26, the Global Youth Statement (GYS) has been recognized in all COP outcomes, with Parties to the UNFCCC increasingly recognizing the importance of children and youth participation at all levels of climate decision-making. Inclusion, a fundamental pillar of the COP29 Presidency and the PYCC mandate, will be critical to achieving ambitious and equitable outcomes at COP29 and advocating for youth demands.

This is to help meet climate commitments under Articles 6 and 12 of the Paris Agreement, known as Action on Climate Education (ACE). This program covers all six elements of ACE: climate change education, public awareness, training, public participation, access to information, and international cooperation.

An important aspect of climate action is also ensuring gender equality, actively supporting initiatives aimed at empowering women and girls so that they can play a key role in shaping a sustainable future. A recent needs assessment on the involvement of girls in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) showed that in Kyrgyzstan, only one third of women actively use the Internet and are computer literate. The share of female graduates in STEM is 31.3%. This is clearly insufficient for women to actively participate in the digital transformation process.

The mountainous regions of Central Asia are not only a source of fresh water and biodiversity, but also home to millions of people. These ecosystems are at serious risk from climate change, and their conservation requires urgent action. Young people, as protectors and guardians of nature, must be at the forefront of these efforts, joining forces to protect mountainous regions from the devastating effects of climate change.

Against this backdrop of challenges, the role of young people and children becomes even more important. They are not just inheriting the world, they are actively creating it. And this role requires from all parties not only the right to participate in decision-making, but also the responsibility to take the initiative, put forward bold ideas, and hold leaders accountable to their promises. Young people are not just adapting to new conditions – they are initiating change, contributing to a sustainable future.

Session objectives:

- 1. To discuss the role of youth and children in climate processes, as well as in the conservation of mountain ecosystems in the context of the global challenges of climate change.
- 2. Provide youth and children with tools and platforms to initiate and implement projects on climate change and the conservation of mountain ecosystems.
- 3. To highlight the leadership role of the Kyrgyz Republic in initiatives to protect mountain regions.
- 4. To develop specific recommendations and initiatives for international cooperation on the protection of mountain ecosystems with the participation of youth.

- Emphasis on international cooperation and leadership in climate processes of the Kyrgyz Republic;
- Strengthening the role of youth and children in global climate processes;

- Signing a resolution to consolidate efforts and take concrete measures at the global level.
